Professor Hall specializes in health care law and public policy. His present research interests include consumer-driven health care, doctor/patient trust, insurance regulation, and genetics. He is the author or editor of a dozen books on health care law and policy, including *Making Medical Spending Decisions*, and *Health Care Law and Ethics*.



The new paradigm of "consumer-driven health care," which shifts payment responsibility from insurers to patients, calls for a fundamental rethinking of professional ethics and medical law. Based on a range of historical sources, two basic issues will be discussed that have been at the core of the treatment relationship since the beginning of medicine: how should physicians go about billing and collecting from patients, and may courts set aside medical bills that are outrageously expensive?
